
Instructions for the Sticky Note Grid Puzzle Project by Brian Marks

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
Supplies:

____4 x 6 Index Cards _____ 3 x 3 Sticky Notes _____A Blank Grid ____Pencil and Marker __Glue and Scissors


STEP 1: Draw a picture on a blank labeled grid that you would like to have students reproduce at a later time. Sketch in pencil if desired and finish in black marker.




STEP 2: Lay out Index Cards vertically to match the grid squares from your grid drawing.




STEP 3: Label near the top of each index card the Letter and Number to match your grid drawing. Allow space underneath to add your cut out grid squares and a sticky note.



STEP 4: Cut the squares from your grid drawing example and glue them just below the grid coordinates on the matching index card.



STEP 5: Add a sticky note below the grid square on the index card.



STEP 6: Randomly distribute the index cards to individual students in a group and let the students draw what they see in the square on the sticky note. You can re-use these cards over and over by replacing sticky notes when finished with a group of students.

STEP 7: Collect the index cards and re-assemble the grid to create the final group drawn masterpiece.

*This is a small sample of how to create a Sticky Note Grid Puzzle Project. I use larger grids with around 30 different squares for a large classroom of students.
